LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Dear Friends of The INN Between,

As I reflect on my 8th year at The INN Between, I am filled with gratitude for the incredible journey we have shared. This past year has been one of both tremendous growth and deepened impact, as we continued to stand alongside our community's most vulnerable with compassion, dignity, and unwavering commitment.

Thanks to your support, we expanded our capacity to 65 beds, allowing us to respond to a 48% increase in demand for our services. Each number in this report represents more than a statistic—it represents a life touched, a story honored, and a community that said, you will not face this alone. From those who transitioned into stable housing, to those who experienced a peaceful passing surrounded by love, our work affirms the belief that every life deserves care, dignity, and connection.

This year also brought remarkable progress in securing the future of our mission. We were successful at the Utah Legislature in obtaining both one-time funds to support our expansion and ongoing, sustainable funding to ensure continuity of care. Additionally, we moved one step closer to financial sustainability with the approval of Utah's 1115 Medical Respite Waiver by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS)—a milestone that paves the way for Medicaid billing in the near future. These policy victories reflect growing recognition of the vital role medical respite plays in breaking the cycle of homelessness and medical crisis.

We also advanced new initiatives that strengthen the foundation of our mission. With the launch of programs like mindfulness and life skills classes, along with continued partnerships in medical respite research, we are addressing not only immediate needs but also building pathways to long-term healing and stability. These efforts remind us that lasting change requires both compassionate care and innovative solutions.

I am continually inspired by the resilience of our residents, the dedication of our staff, and the generosity of our volunteers and donors. Together, we have created not just a safe space, but a home—where healing, hope, and humanity thrive.

As we look to the year ahead, I invite you to continue walking this path with us. Your belief in our mission makes it possible to honor life's final chapters with dignity, while also opening new chapters of recovery and renewal for so many others.

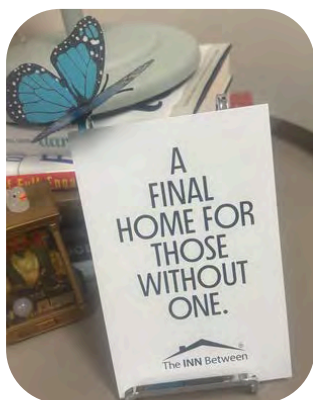

SUCCESSFUL HOUSING PLACEMENTS



We have a specially trained team of volunteers that sit bedside with each resident who may be in their last hours. The "No One Dies Alone" (NODA) team provides that human connection that leads to a dignified death. After a resident passes, we take the time to honor and memorialize. The INN Between will also hold memorials and posts obituaries on our website at the wishes of the resident, and etch their name in stone in our Memorial Garden.



In addition to clinical care, we provide:

- No One Dies Alone (NODA): trained volunteers sit bedside so no resident faces their final hours alone.
- Life Skills & Mindfulness Programs: new initiatives to support coping skills, self-sufficiency, and holistic healing.
- Housing Pathways: case management to help residents transition into stable housing whenever possible.
- Hope: belonging, community, dignity, and connection.
- Advocacy & Innovation: as a recognized leader in medical respite, we are expanding capacity and preparing to sustain services through Medicaid billing under Utah's 1115 Waiver.

PEOPLE EXPERIENCED DEATH WITH DIGNITY

Since opening in August 2015, nearly 1,000 individuals have utilized our services, totaling over 100,000 bed nights. Over 160 of those people experienced a peaceful passing with dignity and respect, in a bed, surrounding by caregivers, and not alone on the street.



The last individual to pass with us this year. We post this on social media along with a short message. "We honor the life of Jose (October 10, 1957 - June 19, 2025), who passed away peacefully in his bed just days after arriving at The INN Between on June 11th. Though our time with him was brief, Jose became a part of our community, and we are grateful to have provided him with comfort and dignity in his final days. We gathered to remember him at a memorial on June 23rd, holding space for reflection and respect. Rest in peace, Jose."

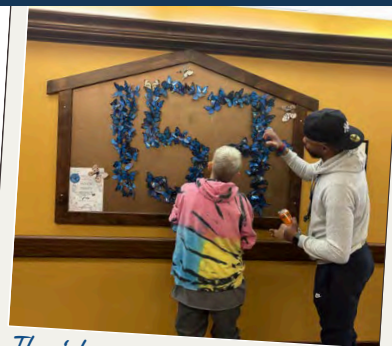

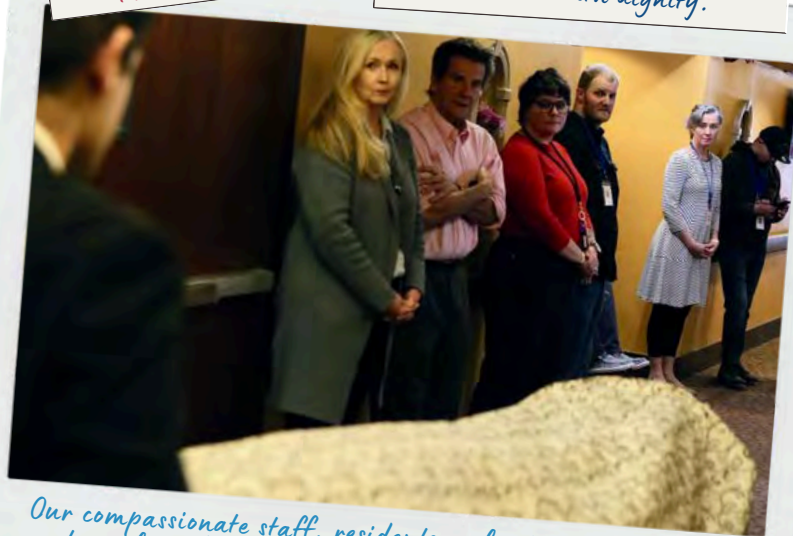
We are more than a facility — we

- Community members in their final stage of life, who deserve hospice care in a safe and loving home.

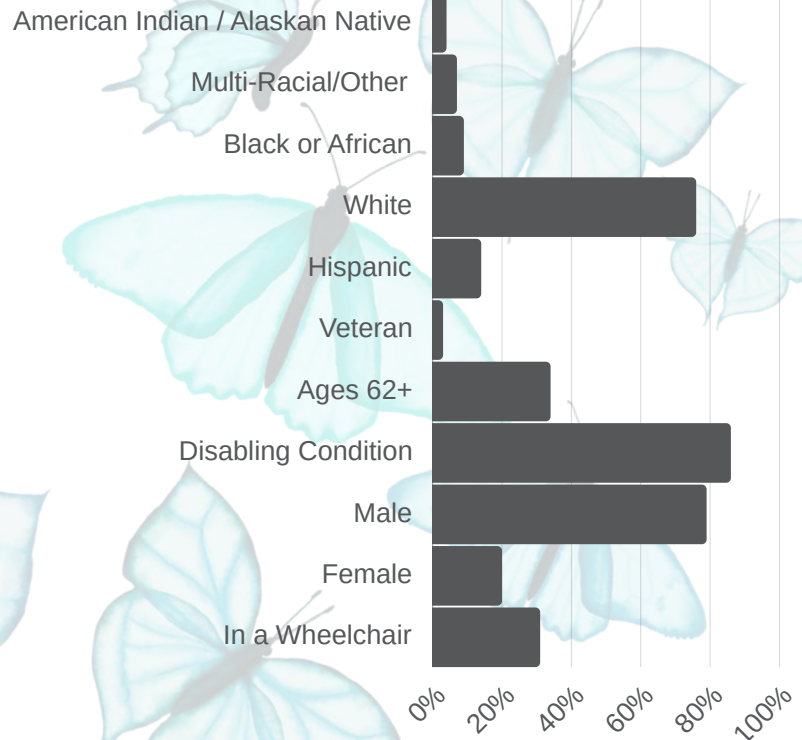

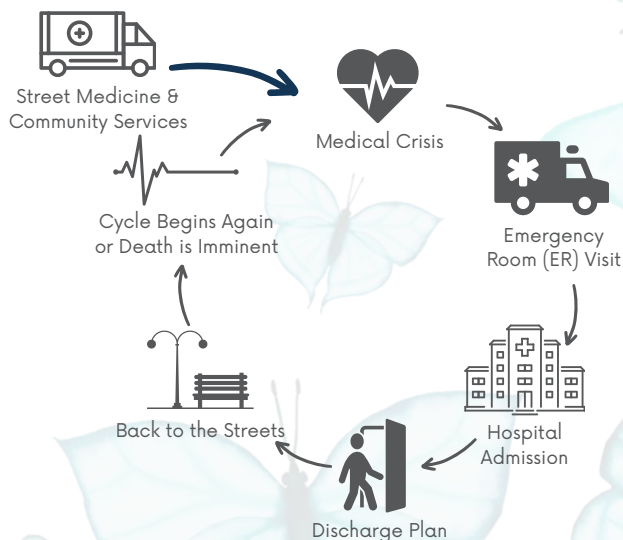
We strive to ensure that people who are terminally ill and inadequately sheltered have access to professional hospice care in a safe and caring home.

Medical Respite Care

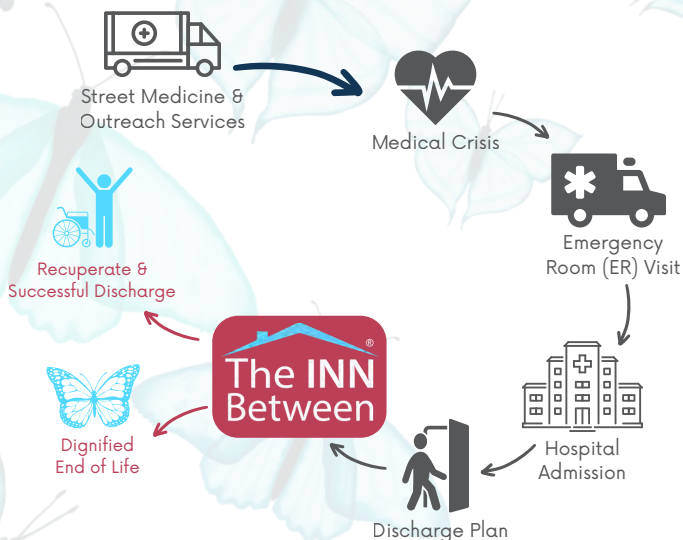

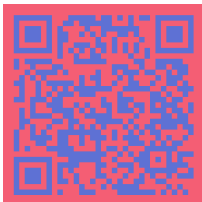

END-OF-LIFE CARE RESIDENT

Just before The INN Between celebrated its 9th anniversary, we said goodbye to Mike—our 140th passing. He took his final breath with a No One Dies Alone (NODA) volunteer by his side, ensuring that even in his last moments, he was not alone.

The year before coming to The INN Between, Mike's life was upended. He lost his job, his income, and eventually his utilities were shut off. Diagnosed with head and neck cancer, he underwent a tracheotomy, which left him struggling not only physically but emotionally. The weight of it all became unbearable, and feeling like he had nowhere left to turn, Mike planned to end his life.

Before that desperate day, Mike had spent his entire life in the home where he was raised. His mother passed away when he was just seven years old, leaving him in the care of his grandfather, father, and disabled sister. Mike became her primary caregiver, receiving financial assistance that allowed him to be there 24/7. Over time, his family dwindled—his grandfather passed, then his father, and finally, his sister. With her loss, the financial support he relied on disappeared. His cancer made it impossible to work, and his untreated mental health struggles overwhelmed him. After a crisis brought him to the hospital, Mike was referred to The INN Between, where he found stability, safety, and dignity in his final chapter. Though he was quiet and kept to himself, he made his room a home, taking immaculate care of his space.

The last time Mike left our building, he was draped in a University of Utah shirt—a proud tribute to his days as a Utes football player. His commitment to his alma mater never wavered. Go Utes!

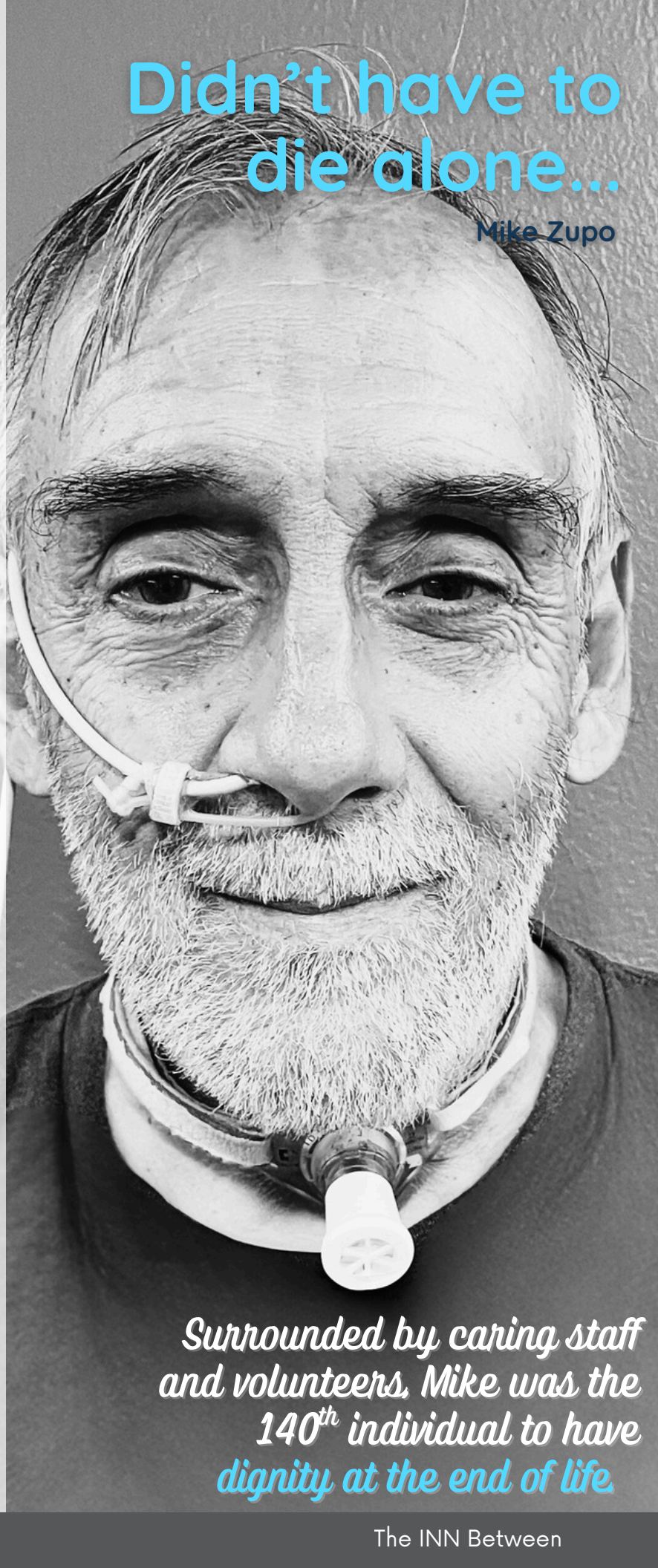

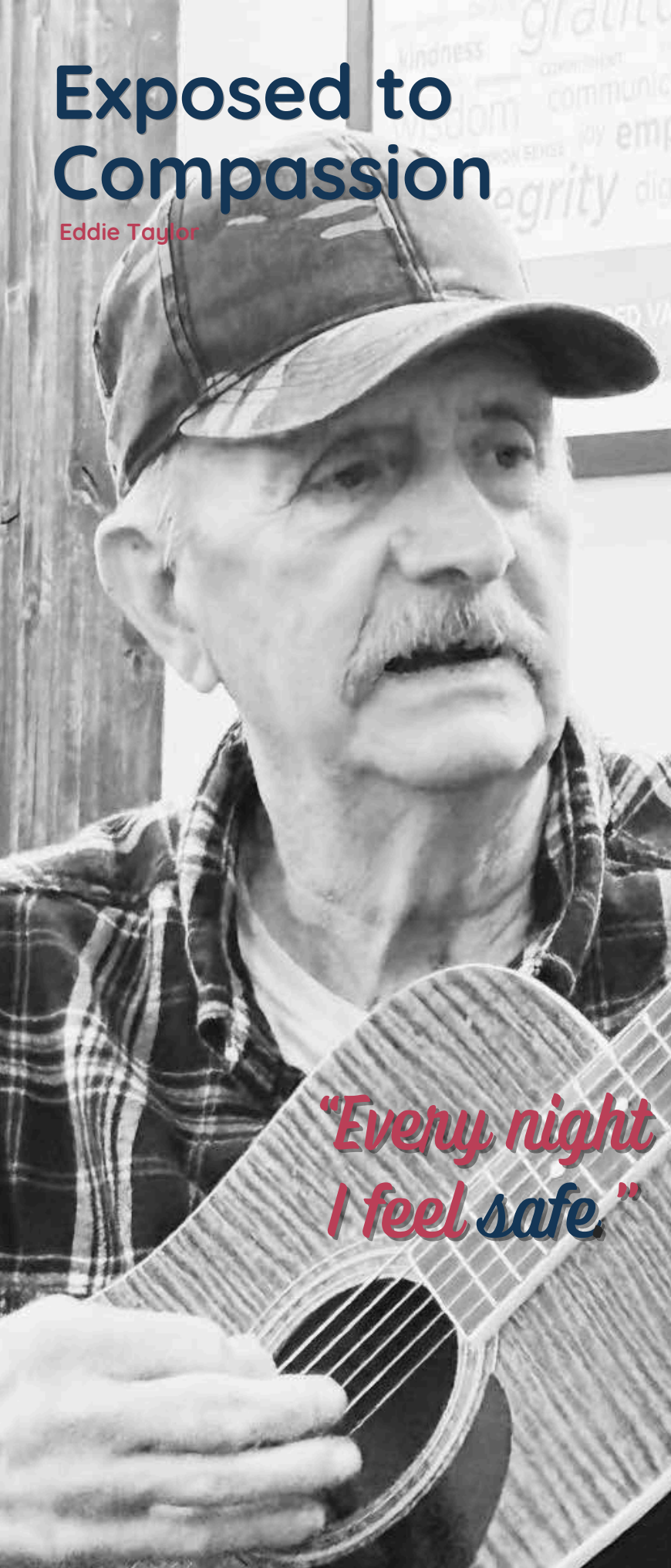

Exposed to Compassion

Eddie Taylor



PALLIATIVE CARE RESIDENT

After a series of hospital transfers that took him from Kemmer, Wyoming to Logan and finally to the University of Utah, Eddie arrived at The INN Between seeking stability and care. In his early 70s, Eddie had been living in a place not meant for human habitation. Battling cancer, he needed not only safe shelter but a supportive environment where he could determine his next steps and focus on his health.

Eddie's life reflects a spirit of resilience and hard work. Raised in Wyoming alongside three brothers and one sister, he grew up surrounded by wide fields and small-town community. His first job was helping with hay, followed by years of work in coal mining, construction, ranching, and logging. One of his fondest memories is his 11th birthday party, when every classmate joined him for cake, ice cream, lemonade, and a baseball game in the field.

Music has been one of Eddie's lifelong joys. At 12, he picked up the guitar, later adding banjo and piano. In the late 1960s, he was the drummer in a Rock n' Roll band, and over the years he played with his father-in-law's group at family celebrations, holidays, and community dances. Today, he finds peace and comfort in The INN Between's music room, where strumming the guitar continues to be both healing and grounding.

Family remains central to Eddie's story. He was married to his first wife, Ruthie, for 20 years before her passing. Together, they raised three children. After nearly two decades of friendship, Eddie remarried in February 2024. Though the future remains uncertain, his hope is to one day reunite with his family in Colorado.

For now, Eddie is grateful for each day. "Every night I feel safe, seen, and supported. It's a wonderful place to be," he shares. "The nursing and staff are great and work with all of us. The staff couldn't be better."

At The INN Between, Eddie has found more than safety. He has found dignity, companionship, and a place where his music and memories are honored — a true home during one of life's most difficult chapters.

MIRACLE RESIDENT

In June of 2021, The INN Between received a call from CNS about a man in desperate need of care. At just 60 years old, Terry was facing Stage 4 kidney disease, with only 12% kidney function. He was given two options: begin dialysis immediately or enter hospice care. At the time, Terry was living at the Rescue Mission, employed there, but struggling to manage his health after a partial foot amputation due to diabetes. Homelessness, advanced illness, and an uncertain future had converged all at once.

Terry's story began far from Utah. Originally from California, he built a career as a commercial truck driver, living out of his rig. When illness struck, he lost not only his health but also his livelihood and his "home" — the 16-wheeler that had been his shelter and his independence.

When Terry moved into The INN Between, his first priority was stabilizing his health and starting dialysis. With consistent care and support, he gradually began to improve. Shortly after settling in, Terry offered his own skills to give back. A seasoned driver, he became our trusted Transportation Manager. In October 2021, The INN Between officially hired him to drive residents to and from medical appointments. Over the next three years, Terry logged thousands of miles, ensuring others in need received the same chance at healing that he had been given.

In March 2025, Terry reached a milestone that once seemed impossible: he moved into a senior living community while continuing dialysis. Remarkably, the man who once qualified for hospice care left The INN Between able to care for himself, remain active on the kidney transplant list, and look forward with hope.

Terry's journey embodies the spirit of resilience and recovery. What began as a placement for end-of-life care became a story of second chances — made possible through stability, dignity, and the unwavering support of a community that believed in him.

MEDICAL RESPITE RESIDENT

After nearly ten years of homelessness, Renaud had come to believe the streets were his only home. Between Pioneer Park and the canyons, he endured life in a wheelchair while battling bone spurs, ulcers, and neuropathy. Despite these challenges, he remained a deep thinker with a love of herbal remedies and alternative medicine, often sharing health factoids and engaging in thoughtful conversations with those around him.

Reynaud arrived at The INN Between in need of a safe place to heal from stasis ulcers on both legs, caused by varicose veins with ulcer and inflammation and complicated by acquired lymphedema. Without stable housing, his wounds could not properly heal and his health would continue to decline. At The INN Between, he found the support, medical care, and stability necessary to focus on recovery and begin regaining strength.

For years, Renaud resisted care coordination, reluctant to hope for change. But with the collaborative support of The INN Between and the Volunteers of America street outreach team, he made a turning point. He successfully secured Social Security Disability benefits, giving him enough income to qualify for stable housing at Palmer Court and access food assistance.

On his last day at The INN Between, Renaud stood outside with a small bag of belongings, smiling despite the February cold. "I'm getting my apartment today. Ed is picking me up, and he's always early," he said proudly. Weeks later, a money order arrived — a donation from Renaud himself, a testament to his gratitude for the care and dignity he had found.

In just 86 days, the cycle of homelessness that had defined nearly a decade of his life was broken. Renaud secured housing, income, and stability — proof that with compassion, collaboration, and the right support, lives can be transformed.

VOLUNTEERS

As we near our 10th year, the dedication of our volunteers shines brighter than ever. People from all walks of life step forward to support our mission, reminding us daily of the power of compassion in action. With our facility often at full capacity, volunteers have been essential partners in providing medical respite and end-of-life care to more than 300 individuals this year.

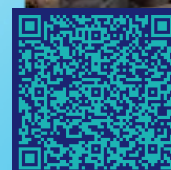

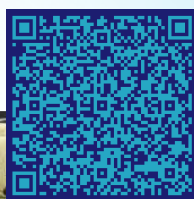

CAPITAL PROJECTS

Resident Room Flooring

Completed

This year, we successfully completed a much-needed flooring project, replacing the dilapidated flooring in resident rooms with durable, commercial-grade LVP. In the past, many rooms had mismatched finishes — and in some cases, even duct tape holding sections together.

The new flooring not only enhances the dignity and comfort of each resident's living space, but it also plays a critical role in infection control, safety, and ease of cleaning. With this upgrade, residents now have a more welcoming and hygienic environment to heal, recover, and find peace.

This project represents more than just new floors — it reflects our commitment to creating a safe, respectful, and dignified home for every person we serve.



IN PROGRESS

HVAC & Room Updates

In Progress

Our expansion is unfolding in two strategic phases to ensure both sustainable growth and responsible fundraising. With the first phase completed, we now have 63 beds available for residents in need.

Thanks to secured funding from the State of Utah, the First Congregational Church and Lowe's Hometown for the second phase, we are moving forward with critical upgrades, including replacing the out-of-code HVAC system, modernizing bathrooms, and enhancing our environment with fresh paint, new furniture, and updated décor.

Once complete, our total capacity will grow to 80 beds, allowing us to serve more individuals than ever before. This expansion will better equip us to meet the urgent medical respite needs of Utah's unsheltered community, ensuring that more people have a safe place to heal, recover, and, when needed, pass with dignity.

Generator

In Progress

Thanks to generous support from Salt Lake County's Community Development Block Grant program, we are moving forward with a critical infrastructure project: a facility-wide generator.

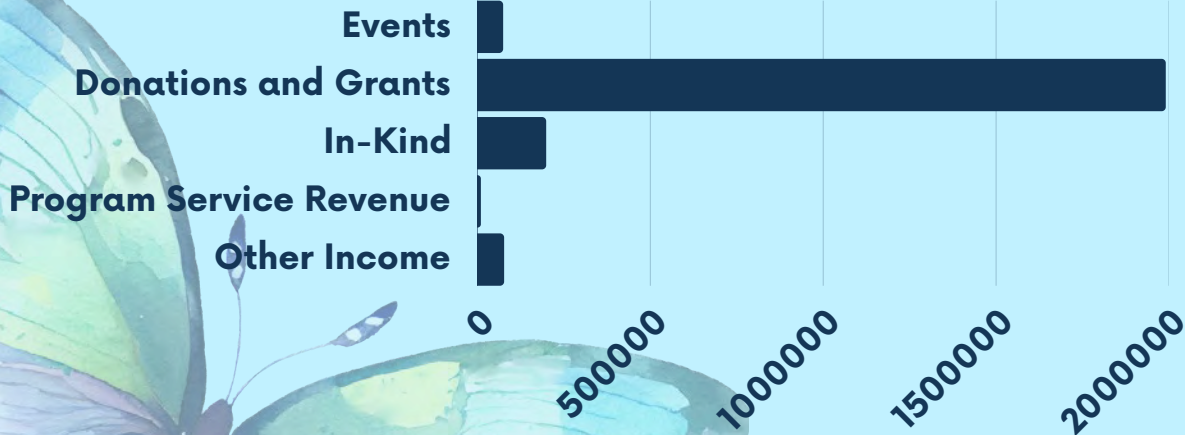
In the event of a power outage, this generator will ensure that our heating and cooling systems, walk-in cooler, freezer, and emergency outlets for oxygen concentrators and other medical equipment continue to function without interruption.

This investment means that residents who are medically fragile will not face the trauma and risk of an evacuation during an emergency causing a loss of power. Instead, they will remain safe in place, with their care, comfort, and medical needs securely supported.

The Generator Project represents more than infrastructure — it is peace of mind for our residents, staff, and community partners, ensuring that The INN Between can provide uninterrupted care, no matter the circumstances.

Christmas Jam

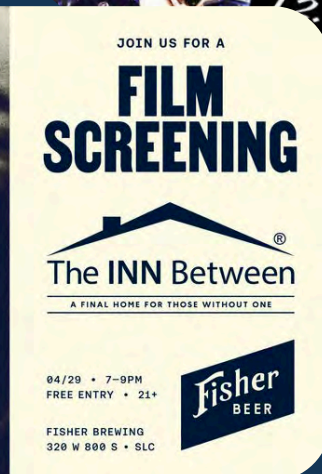
December 14, 2024

A Night in Casablanca

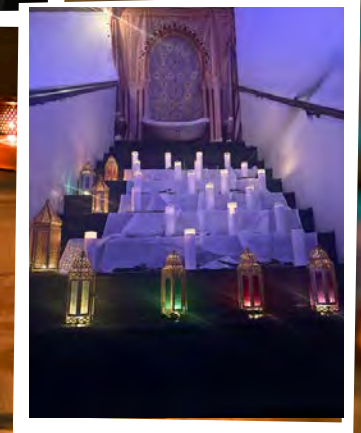
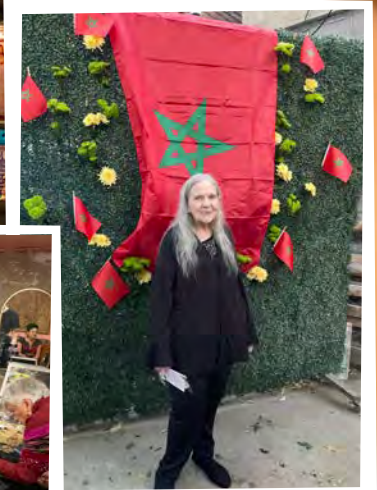
October 11, 2024

9th Anniversary Give Back Party

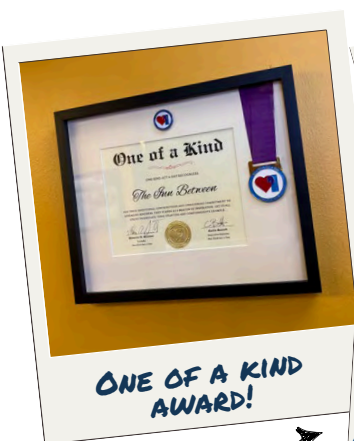
